# **CONSTITUTION**

### **The Du Preez Collection**

Since the conclusion of the AGM, the Committee has been hard at work sorting through the ML Du Preez Collection, which was donated to the Society in February 2017. For those of you reading this not knowing what I am talking about, I have a short note in my Annual Report (available for download from the Website). In essence it involves sorting through literally thousands of specimens,



checking labels, photographing shells we want to keep, and then repacking them into new boxes for protection.

The task was always going to be a daunting one, but I think it only dawned upon us what the real scope of work and effort was once we got started on the first box. We have since put in 10 hours of work (with literal sweat, I tell you!) over the course of two Saturdays, and sorted through approximately 80 books and 12 boxes of shells – with another 6 or so boxes left, plus three large drawer cabinets full of specimens. So, many hours of sweat left...

Once done, we will inform all of our Members of our plans regarding the “excess”, i.e. those specimens we have purposely set aside for redistribution within the Society. We do have a few nifty ideas – most of them conjured up during lunch while scoffing pizza, so nothing official yet – but it may involve things like “money tokens” as opposed to real money (the word “fairness” comes to mind here), as well as “auction days”.

Whatever the decision, it is bound to be lots of fun: we already have about six boxes full of shells we do not want to keep, and these will all go towards the “redistribution” effort. Keep your eyes peeled for more information.

### **Lifetime Achievement Awards**

During our last Committee Meeting (held on 29 July) we discussed the need for a set of requirements for eligibility for a Society Lifetime Achievement Award (LTA). Two have been issued thus far (one to Barbara Fouche, the second to Roy Aiken) – and I am sure we can all think of many people who deserve such an award – but truth be told we all have varying reasons why people should get one.

We have to be consistent, and in response to this we have tasked Ken Brown to develop the first draft of the Society LTA "Requirements List". Once written, we will be lobbying it around within the Committee, before "casting it in concrete". We will then share the contents with all of our members, and also put it on the Website.

All ensuing LTAs will then conform to the published LTA Requirements, so as to ensure that fairness and transparency is maintained throughout the process.

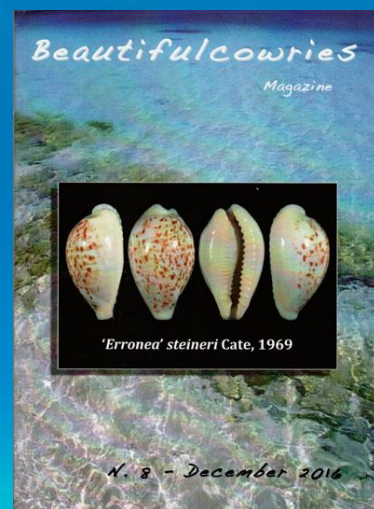
In addition, once we have the official and published list of Requirements, anyone will be most welcome to nominate Society Members for an LTA.
